

#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Parents & Caregivers,

#### **NSW Teachers Federation Industrial Action**

a disruption to teaching tomorrow, Tuesday December 3, due to a 2 hour Stop Work meeting from 9am - 11am.

The 2 hour state wide stoppage has been called to discuss Gonski funding and implications for schools and teachers, particularly rural and remote schools.

Due to high level of staff participation in the industrial action, the school will be providing minimal supervision only between 8.30am and 11am.

Normal classes will not operate during this time however bus children K-12 will be supervised by three teachers with alternate activities.

Town children are requested to arrive at 11.05am due to supervision ratios.

The canteen will be open as usual.

School Swimming Scheme will be cancelled on Tuesday 3rd December due to the industrial action. If you have prepaid your pool entry fee, your child will be refunded their \$2:50 for that session. Swimming for Primary sport will go ahead as

#### SENIOR SCIENCE EXCURSION

Early start, warm day, perfect conditions for an excursion to Dubbo with Baradine Central School's Senior Science class comprising of three young ladies – Jacinta Pickette, Josephine Mitchell and Amy Anderson. The aim of the day: to explore the Dubbo Regional Botanic Gardens and discover the benefits of blood donation, with the possibility of the students donating for the first time.

The day started quietly, until the request for music came from the back seat. Courageous Science teacher Mrs Alix Talbott relented and allowed her students to choose a radio station. Thankfully the music seemed to comatose the students and all arrived safely in Dubbo to a blustery reception. The next request – lunch; surely 10am is too early for such a meal but seeing as we were hoping to donate blood a meal and plenty of fluids was determined to be a good idea. A little Christmas shopping was squeezed in whilst we waited for the wind to cease.


The wind died down and we journeyed to the Regional Botanic Gardens to explore the diversity of the grounds and consider water management practices. The weather was warm, the fish were swimming (thankfully the students didn't join them) and a stroll around the grounds was delightful. The students became aware of the diversity in such an area, the vast number of different plants and animals and the



interactions between them. All the students were captivated by the number and size of the koi in the main water feature and there was much clicking of photos to capture the moment.

The time had come .... time to drain the blood. Being a frequent donor myself, I thought it was wonderful that the students were interested in participating in such an adventure. Blood donation is such a special gift and it is such an essential service in our communities. According to the Red Cross Blood Service website 1 in 3 Australians will require blood or a blood product at some point in our lives, but only 1 in every 30 of us will roll up our sleeve and donate. Jacinta and Josephine filled out their forms and waited to be interviewed. Sitting in the chair with my arm bandaged, having donated already, I waited to see if they would be able to donate. Both students were cleared to donate. Even Josephine's fear of needles didn't stop her from giving the gift of life. The blood centre staff were excellent and even took the students on a walk-through of the centre, explaining how the blood is processed, the screening process and the uses of the blood and blood products. Our plasma alone (about 55% of whole blood) can be transformed into 17 different products.

Our donations potentially saved the lives of 9 people.

Students are still attending in thin, canvas shoes which are not permitted in the garden, workshop, food tech room, ag plot or at school in general.
