The grant of \$14,900 will be applied to developing the kitchen garden program into a more water wise and drought proofed garden to endure the years ahead and benefit many current and future primary students .


# **New BCS Bus**



# **NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM**

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2020 the following vaccines will be offered:

YEARS	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
	Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine	2-doses at least 6 months apart
Year 7	Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine	Single dose
Years 10	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine	Single dose


Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that, to improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses during Year 7 or 8 (for HPV and dTpa vaccination) and during Year 10 or 11 (for Meningococcal ACWY vaccination).

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at <a href="https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/">www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/</a> Pages/withdraw consent.aspx.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic either as a physical card or a text message sent to the mobile number recorded on the consent form. Details about vaccinations given at school will also be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to support complete vaccination histories.

This February, 25 Baradine Central School students were offered an education and cultural enrichment opportunity ,when they were given the chance to travel to Winnipeg, Canada for two weeks. The experience has enriched the lives of all involved as they participated in a wide variety of activities including going to school.



The excursion began on February 8<sup>th</sup> where all staff and students said a teary goodbye to loved ones that morning. They then travelled the 7 hours to Sydney where they stayed at the Ibis Budget hotel before their 12pm flight the next day. By the time students got to the airport, there were some nerves but mostly they seemed excited! Students did very well to get through the stringent security and customs services at Sydney airport and enjoyed some time to themselves before boarding their 14 hour flight to Vancouver. Staff were worried we would have some tears or anxiety because for many this was their first time on a plane, but all students boarded well and spent their time browsing the myriad of films available to them. Once we landed in Vancouver, students got an amazing glimpse of the Rocky Mountains at the airport. This only improved during their 3 hour flight to Winnipeg in which we flew over the phenomenal view.

We touched down in Winnipeg at 3pm and students were greeted by a sea of white! Just like the plane trip, for many this was their first time seeing such an expanse of snow. After receiving some loaned clothing from generous host families, students travelled to Camp Manitou. It was a nerve racking trip for staff who had to drive to the camp on the other side of the road! But all made it safe and sound. Students were lucky enough to have an only -12 degree afternoon (practically balmy for Winnipeg) and enjoyed a snow ball fight.

Over their week at the camp, students enjoyed participating in a variety of activities. They went ice skating and cross country skiing. Although some students did fall over quite a bit, they eventually got the hang of it and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. Students also went to the Assiniboine Zoo, it being winter there weren't many visitors, which suited us just fine as it meant we could get very close to some of the exhibits. We saw snow leopards, polar bears, wolves, seals, sting rays, tigers and many more. The ice hockey was one of the highlights of the trip! Students received free tickets, courtesy of the Winnipeg Jets, and saw them verse the New York Rangers. After a nail biting game, the jets didn't come home with a win but students were featured on the big screen no less than 3 times. One of our coldest days on the trip was -48 degrees. On this day we went ice fishing. Students rugged up and braved the cold, with some even getting to drill the fishing holes on the lake. Tents were set up to stop the wind chill and students gave this activity a good go, unfortunately we didn't get a bite but it was certainly an amazing

experience. No-one will complain about a -2 degree day in Baradine again! Throughout the trip, students also participated in a variety of educational activities. They attended the Canadian Museum of Human Rights in which they received a 2 hour tour filled with facts about human rights in Canada and around the world and engaged in activities. Students and staff were interested to learn about the colonisation of Canada and the treatment of Indigenous populations, which was not so different to experiences here in Australia. They also attended the Festival De Voyager (another -40 degree day) where students learnt about Indigenous and French settlers and how they survived in a cold harsh environment. They saw real furs, visited a blacksmiths cottage, harvested maple water (which is boiled down to



make maple syrup), and participated in Indigenous hoop dancing and traditional drumming activities. These were the stand out activities of the day, partly because they were fun and interesting and partly because they were inside and out of the cold.

Students also had time with their host families, experiencing firsthand the lives of different people and cultures. As part of this, they attended school with their host families. Students in year 8 attended Leila North School and spent time in Miles MacFarlane's Year 8 home room. Here there was a focus on project based learning in which students designed their own house to scale and then constructed it to scale using cardboard.



They also attended a field trip (on a yellow school bus from the movies) where they saw a play on Indigenous experiences in residential homes and went to the Forks Markets for some shopping. Students in years 9 - 12 attended Maples Collegiate. Here they saw what senior school is like in Canada and were able to visit a variety of classes including Woodwork, PE, Maths, Science, Technology, Audio-visual and auto-shop. This school has over 1600 students and has its own television station and space to service cars. Students were very popular and when the time came were sad to leave. It is hoped that students from both schools keep in touch with the friends they made.

Students began the long journey home on Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup>. A quick flight from Winnipeg to Vancouver meant we had an 18 hour layover, but this gave us time to do a tour of the city. Although not as cold or snowy in Vancouver, it was certainly rainy. Students crossed the Capilano Suspension Bridge and enjoyed the views from the cliff walk. They also got the opportunity to shop at the Granville Island markets and saw some reconstructions of Indigenous totem poles. IT was an excellent tour and students enjoyed 5 hours at the airport to rest up before their 14 hour flight home to Sydney. After more security and baggage collection we hopped on the bus and were back in Baradine by 7pm Monday 24<sup>th</sup> of February.






