## Message from the Principal

Dear Parents and Caregivers

#### 19 Update

Despite NSW 'opening up' from October 11, BCS is continuing to operate under Warrumbungle LGA Level 3 restrictions until further notice from the Government and Health department. *From 11 October stay*-at-home orders are lifted across NSW. Schools in areas where short-term stay-at-home orders had been in place under a snap lockdown will return to face-toface learning and teaching under Level 3 settings subject to health advice. All staff and students are expected to be at school with visitors and activities limited.

The following regional LGAs are operating at Level 3 from 11 October: Albury, Armidale, Ballina, Balranald, Bega Valley, Bellingen, Berrigan, Bland, Blayney, Bogan, Brewarrina, Byron, Cabonne, Carrathool, Central Darling, Clarence Valley, Cobar, Coffs Harbour, Coolamon, Coonamble, Cootamundra-Gundagai Regional, Cowra, Dungog, Edward River, Federation, Forbes, Gilgandra, Glen Innes Severn, Greater Hume Shire, Griffith, Gunnedah, Gwydir, Hay, Hilltops, Inverell, Junee, Kempsey, Kyogle, Lachlan, Lismore, Leeton, Liverpool Plains, Lockhart, Mid-Coast, Mid-Western Regional, Moree Plains, Murray River, Murrumbidgee, Muswellbrook, Nambucca, Narrabri, Narrandera, Narromine, Oberon, Orange, Parkes, Port Macquarie-Hastings, Richmond Valley, Singleton, Snowy-Monaro Regional, Snowy Valleys, Tamworth Regional, Temora, Tenterfield, Tweed, Upper Hunter Shire, Upper Lachlan Shire, Uralla, Wagga Wagga, Walcha, Walgett, Warren, Warrumbungle Shire, Weddin, Wentworth, Yass Valley, and Unincorporated NSW areas.

While at school, face masks are required in all indoor and outdoor settings for all staff. Masks are required indoors for students Year 7 and above and recommended outdoors (unless eating or exercising). Masks are recommended indoors and outdoors for primary students (unless eating or exercising).

All staff at Level 3 schools must be fully vaccinated by 8 November.

#### HSC

BCS's eight Year 12 students are part of the cohort of **76,399** students are studying one or more HSC courses in 2021. **68,710** students are on track to complete their HSC program – making the HSC the most popular school credential in Australia in 2021.

The exams are scheduled to commence on Tuesday 8 November and conclude on Friday 3 December . Our students will be sitting papers in the following courses and we wish them success as they undertake final study preparations over the next three weeks.

#### Careers

BCS has always pursued School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships for interested senior students. Some of the student training undertaken & completed over recent years has been in the fields of agriculture, vehicles & small motors, education, IT and health.

I thought I'd share a media release from NESA 12/10/21 pertaining to future opportunities and pathways.

#### NESA media release

A program to improve education and career outcomes for high school students will be expanded to schools across NSW over the next two years, thanks to a \$13.5 million investment from the NSW Government.

The Educational Pathways Program (EPP) introduces students to different post-school study and employment options, and will expand from 24 schools to up to 139 public schools across NSW from next year.

The program has been extremely successful since it was introduced in 2020, with the number of students enrolling in school-based apprenticeships and traineeships tripling across the schools participating in the pilot.

Minister for Skills and Tertiary Education Geoff Lee said investing in career education and skills training for young people was key to keeping the NSW economy strong into the future.

"Encouraging the next generation to consider an apprenticeship or traineeship through this program will help to reduce future skills shortages and create a highly employable workforce," Mr Lee said.

"Through this program, a growing number of Year 10, 11 and 12 students are earning and starting their career in industry while learning new skills in the classroom." "The program is about exposing school students to the different directions they can take in their career so they can make informed and confident decisions."

Minister for Education Sarah Mitchell said the NSW Government was supporting high school students looking to take the first step in their career.

"Greater Year 12 retention, increased completion of schoolbased apprenticeships and traineeships, and increased participation in post-school education are just some of the benefits of the program," Ms Mitchell said.

Secondary public schools in the Illawarra, New England and North West, Newcastle, Lake Macquarie and Hunter Valley, Central Coast, Southern Highlands and Shoalhaven, as well as Western Sydney suburbs of Parramatta and Blacktown, will have access to the Educational Pathways Program in 2022.

The NSW Government's investment in the Education Pathways Program will fund:

+ Strengthened career guidance and support for school students under specialist teachers for school based apprentices and trainees.

+ Immersion programs with Registered Training Organisations, including TAFE NSW, to give high school students 'vocational tasters' of different industries.

✤ Workshops to teach students employability skills, such as how to prepare for a job interview, how to communicate with employers, and how to manage their online presence.

Dedicated careers support to connect students to local employers and jobs.


