

What is the most important rule at home and at school?


At home it is that I have to feed the animals before I feed myself and at school it's to keep hands and feet to myself.


This Term, students in 4/5/6 have been completing the art unit 'Music'.



They have experimented with water colour paints, oil pastels and complementary colours.






