Next Wednesday 26 May, students will be participating in the school cross country carnival. This week in Sport we will be doing a practice run of the course so that students feel familiar with the distance and route they'll be taking.

Following cross country, students will continue to be developing their skills in track and field in PDHPE and afternoon sport sessions. Students have been putting in lots of work developing their fitness levels and improving their technical skills in running, jumping and throwing.

The Athletics carnival will be an exciting event for BCS which will take place on Friday 18 June at the town oval. However, please note that some events will be held earlier due to the lengthy time it can take to complete the event (These dates are included below.)

Mrs Wright clipped 6 sheep in 3 hours and students were in charge of carding the wool, which is flicking the wool up using carding combs. We wore blue on Thursday in support of "Do it for Dolly" and stayed in a 4 bedroom cottage at the Matilda Motor Inn.

We had a 5.30am start on Friday morning. We were at the showground by 7am and started to feed and water our sheep. Mrs Wright clipped a couple more sheep this morning, her clipping skills paid off when the judge Geoff Sutton told me whoever clipped your sheep did an outstanding job, she can come and work for me if she wants.

The school had great success in the judging on the Friday with our two rams being awarded champion and reserve champion. Also, champion and reserve champion ewe and we won the champion group, which included a ram and two ewes.

Saturday morning we packed our gear and headed to the showground to feed and water our sheep and then take them for a walk. We then had the second lot of judging at 2.30pm and 3.30pm.

We were placed 4th out of 11 schools in the interbreed competition and our sheep did look fantastic when lined up against all other breeds and we all received positive comments on our sheep and presentation.

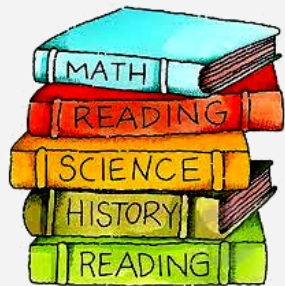

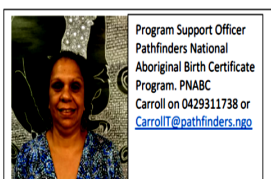

Fee-free white card training for high school students

White card training (or general construction induction card) is available for free to high school students for a limited time only.

What is the white card?

The white card training (CPCCWHS1001 Prepare to work safely in the construction industry) is a nationally recognised course and a mandatory requirement for anyone who wants to work on a construction site.

Students will learn how to identify:

- health and safety legislative requirements of construction work
- construction hazards and risk control measures
- health and safety communication and reporting processes
- incident and emergency response procedures.

Where will it lead?

- Kick start your career in the construction industry with free entry level training.
- Increased employability in the construction sector.
- Competitive edge when applying for jobs.
- Opens opportunities to undertake work experience on a construction site.

Who is eligible?

Training is available to anyone who is:

- aged 16 years or older
- lives or works in NSW
- an Australian citizen, permanent resident, humanitarian visa holder or New Zealand citizen.

When is training available and how long will it take to complete?

The training is available until 30 September 2021 via face-to-face delivery or connected real time delivery.

It will take six hours to complete.
