Before and After School Care

Government consultation has occurred regarding the possible establishment of Before and After School Care (OOSH) at BCS.

Before school care 6am - 8.30am

After school care 3pm - 6pm

However, the OOSH would not be available to preschool children or secondary students – only primary age students from BCS and St Johns. Also, session fees apply for those parents who sign up. More information will be available soon.

Pilot Study for alternate school hours

Some of our students and parents have been involved in another government consultation process regarding alternative school hours. The study is looking at alternatives to the 9am - 3pm school day such as running two school days in one, perhaps 7am-12 and/or 1pm-6pm. Those surveyed were asked for their opinions and ideas on the topic.

Wellbeing Intervention Program (WIP) trial

A trial is currently being run for intervention strategies for a minority of students who have heightened anxiety to attend school since the start of the pandemic.

Data collected during the trial will determine the programs viability to be extended into 2023. It will require a dedicated space and teaching staff. The concept of a school therapy dog is also being explored.

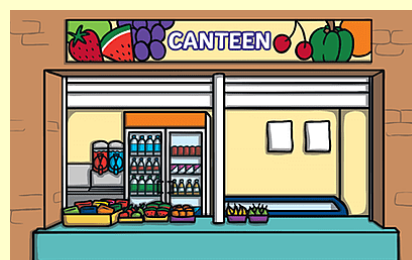

Vocabulary Professional Learning at BCS

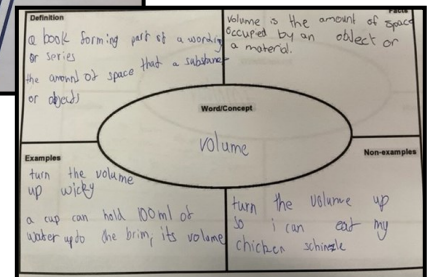
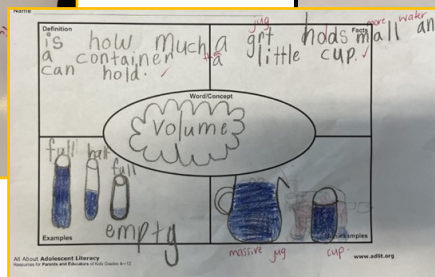
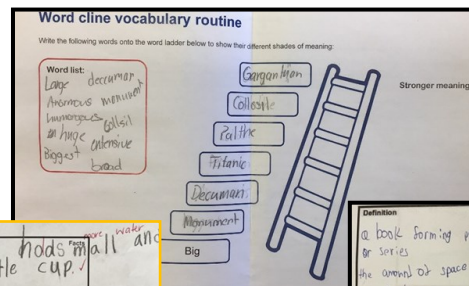
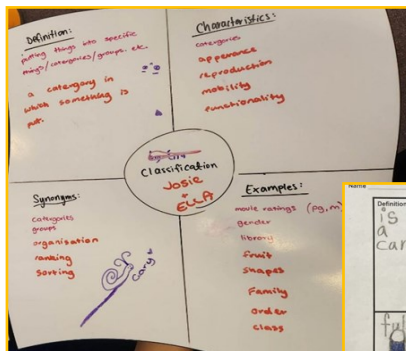
Over the last ten weeks, all staff at BCS have engaged in high impact professional learning based on NAPLAN reading data from 2021. The specific focus derived from this data was the need for explicit teaching of vocabulary across multi-stages. This professional learning and mentoring sessions have been delivered by a Lead Specialist from Tamworth and supported by the school executive team.




These sessions have seen teachers work one-on-one, or in small collaborative groups, to plan explicit vocabulary lessons of Tier 2 (specific content) words. Staff have also explored a range of different resources, pre and post assessments and how to effectively engage students in a range of subjects.

This professional learning journey will continue into 2023 and beyond. This term has been an exciting stepping stone, helping to lead the way for improvement and change in the world of vocabulary to improve reading and writing.

Agriculture

On Thursday the 13th of October, Mrs Wright and Agriculture students, who are competing at the Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza this week, attended a visit to Krysties Meats in Coonabarabran. Anthony Harris and Billy Carey demonstrated to students where the cuts of meat come from, by cutting up a steer carcass.

Students found this to be a very valuable learning experience and were able to visually see where our cuts of meat come from. We also went through what each cut is used for and what are the best cuts of meat. Mrs Wright got Anthony to take all the names and prices off the meat in the cabinet and students had to identify what each cut was.

It was a great experience and I would like to thank Anthony and Billy from Krysties Meats, for dedicating their time and enabling students to partake in this visual demonstration.



Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza



On the 20th of October Mrs Wright and eight agriculture students travelled to the Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza in Scone. Baradine exhibited one unled steer and six heifers. All animals were limousin angus cross. On the Friday students were involved in educational talks and watched a live demonstration of a beef carcass being sliced into its meat cuts. Students had a parading lesson with Mrs Wright and then washed their animals ready for the Saturday competition. Mrs Wright took students across to the RSL that night for a careers talk. It was a valuable evening with over 12 speakers talking about their agricultural careers.

Saturday morning, all heifers were in the first class and there was a line up of 18 animals. Tom led the red heifer and received 5th place while Claudia and Emily Hoffmann were awarded a highly commended with their heifers. All students did a fantastic job with their leading in this class. Emily Murray and Lincon

McConnaughty competed in the parader's competition and Emily was awarded 3rd place in her age group heat. Claudia competed in the meat judging at the abattoirs and found this to be a very worthwhile experience.

That afternoon we went to the sale yards for the unled judging. Students were in groups of three and had to judge four classes of steers and write down their placings on a piece of paper, which was handed in to be marked. Claudia, Chelsea and Emily Murray were Reserve Champions overall- a brilliant result. The girls won a neck collar and grooming brush each.

Our steer was also placed 2nd in his class.

On Sunday students participated in the junior judging and paraders competition. Scone is always a very worthwhile and valuable excursion, as it encompasses many areas within the beef industry.

Hook Results

The black unled steer came 2nd on the hook and two of the heifers placed 3rd and 4th on the hook.

Great results all round !



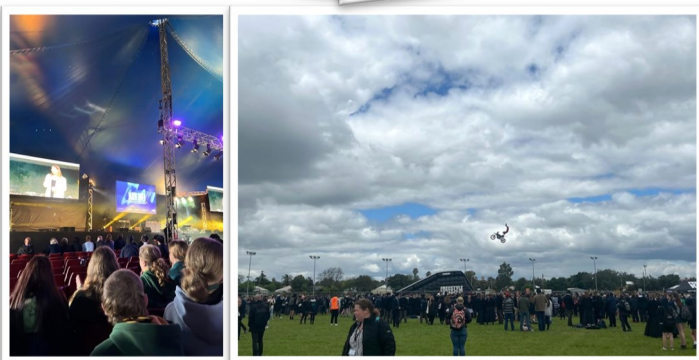

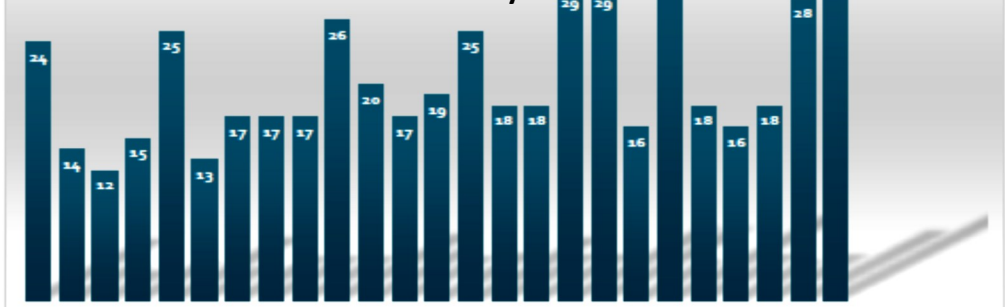

Poultry Show Thursday 17th November

This will be a first for Baradine Central School. The poultry will be washed, dried and prepared for showing on the day by the students. They are judged on their ability to prepare and hold poultry in the correct and safe manner.

The poultry to be shown are our new Isa Browns, each with their own tag and name. These birds will form the start of the egg enterprise in 2023.

The incubators have been turned on. We are expecting fluffy chickens in Week 7.



Cattle Show Thursday 25th November

The school has purchased 9 weaner calves which are being prepared for showing by all the agriculture classes. They have just three weeks to have them ready for the show.

On the day the cattle will be washed, groomed, paraded and shown by the students. All students are challenged to take part in the cattle judging competitions. There will be a BBQ lunch.

Primary Industries

In Term 3 the students worked hard preparing the cattle for the Upper Hunter Beef Bonanza. Now they have shifted their focus to the management of the Santa Gertrudis stud and preparing the new weaners for the upcoming Baradine School show. This week the students have vaccinated, drenched and tagged cattle, performed an operational check on the farm tractor and provided clean feed for our cattle. The focus in the next few weeks is ensuring the students are up to date with their bookwork and on track to perform well in their HSC examination next year.

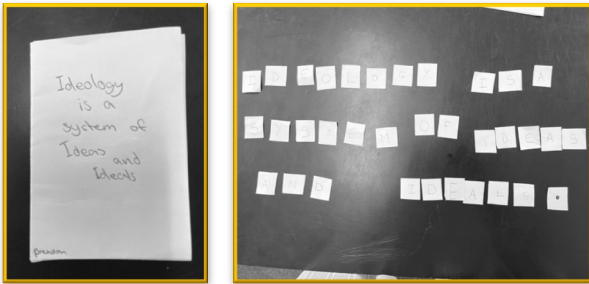
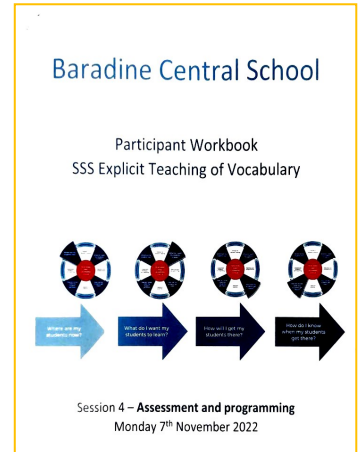

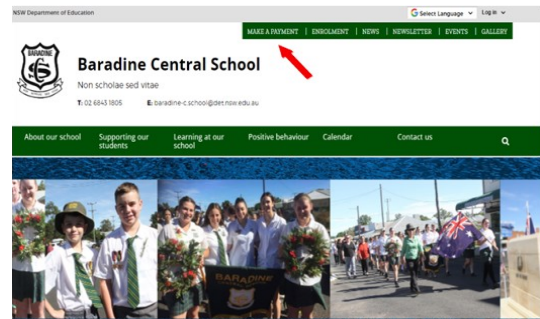
